### **Cheryl Davis Named TRLN Doctoral Fellow at NCSU Libraries**

Cheryl L. Davis was appointed Triangle Research Libraries Network (TRLN) Doctoral Fellow in the Scholarly Communication Center at the NCSU Libraries on September 1, 2004. The TRLN Doctoral Fellows Program, funded by a grant from the Institute of Museum and Library Services (IMLS), combines doctoral coursework with a research project in a TRLN library.

The IMLS grant supports five Fellows: one at each of the TRLN universities (UNC–Chapel Hill, Duke University, North Carolina Central University, and NC State University) and a fifth working jointly with the health sciences libraries of UNC–CH and Duke.

Fellows will develop a library project that reflects a vision of the field in which faculty and practitioners work together to identify important research issues and the study of which has a



positive impact on practice. This is a new approach to preparing the next generation of library faculty to research and teach academic library issues.

Davis holds an M.S.L.S. from UNC–Chapel Hill, a J.D. from Ohio Northern University, and a B.A. in English language and literature from Ohio

Northern University. Davis currently serves as administrator of the NC Guardian ad Litem Program (GAL), managing the statewide pro bono attorney project. She developed and currently manages the statewide GAL Web site that provides resources and training for staff, attorneys, and volunteers. Additional responsibilities include grant writing and directing the organization and cataloging of the Guardian ad Litem library with a group of volunteer paralegals.
